3. Explain the importance of an objective and structured simulation-based skill evaluation in nursing education.

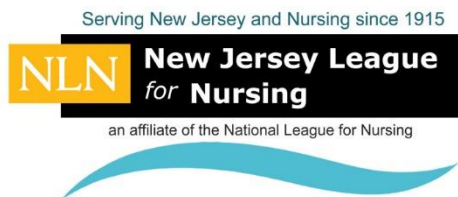
#### Debriefing Not Because I Said So (Part 1 and 2)

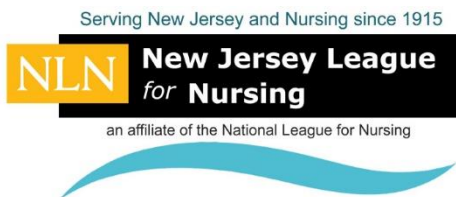
